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EMANCIPATION

Juneteenth was **NOT** the first and only emancipation story in the US

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
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December 31, 1862 many Black people went to church to "watch" the new year come in to see the moment when the Emancipation Proclamation went into effect. Today, churches still hold services and gatherings to honor the past and welcome new opportunities.

A TIMELINE OF EMANCIPATION EVENTS



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JUNE 19TH JUBILEE DAY

Although the Civil War ended on April 9, 1865, Confederate forces in Texas continued to fight. Enslaved people knew they had been freed, but the law was not enforced.

General Granger went to Galveston with 2,000 soldiers to read General Order No. 3

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General Orders No. 3 The people of Texas are informed that in accordance with a proclamation from the Executive of the United States, "all slaves are free". This involves an absolute equality of personal rights and rights of property between former masters and slaves and the connection heretofore existing between them becomes that between employer and hired labor. The freedmen are advised to remain quietly at their present homes and work for wages. They are informed that they will not be allowed to collect at military posts and that they will not be supported in idleness either there or elsewhere. By order of Major General Granger F.W. Emery [signed] Major A.A. Genl.

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Policing Trends in the 18th and Early 19th Century (From The Norfolk Town Assembly)

 Policing focused on fear of fire, vagrants, and keeping "public order"

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<u>FIRST CELEBRATIONS</u>

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
- The first celebration to commemorate the reading of General Order No. 3 and the end of slavery in Texas was on June 19, 1866
- In 1872, Jack Yates, Richard Brock, Richard Allen, and Rev. David Elias Dibble worked together to purchase Emancipation Park in Houston, TX.

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

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

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Emancipation Park

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The 10-acre park was purchased by John Henry "Jack" Yates (a freedman) and three other formerly enslaved men in 1872 and served as a location to celebrate Juneteenth. Until the 1950s, it was the only public park and swimming pool in Houston open to African Americans.
